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# Week 2: Representation of Ethnicity



Task time **2 hours approx.**

## This week's objective:

Understand and apply three key theorists on race, ethnicity, and postcolonialism: **Paul Gilroy, Edward Said, and Alvarado**

## Tasks:

### 1. Learn the Theories:

#### Paul Gilroy – Postcolonialism

- Media reflects **colonial power structures** and **cultural hierarchy**
- Western media often **others** non-white groups
- Black identity is frequently constructed through **stereotypes** and **conflict**
- Positive representation may resist colonial ideas

#### Edward Said – Orientalism

- The "Orient" (Middle East, Asia, Africa) is portrayed as **exotic, backward, dangerous**
- The West defines itself by **contrasting** with the "Other"
- Creates a **binary** of civilised vs uncivilised
- Often used in films, news, and video games (e.g., Aladdin, war coverage)

#### Alvarado – Ethnicity and Stereotypes

Alvarado identified four key ways ethnic minorities are often represented:

- **Exotic** (colourful, mysterious)
- **Dangerous** (criminals, terrorists)
- **Pitied** (refugees, victims)
- **Humorous** (comic relief, sidekick)

Task time **2 hours approx.**

## This week's objective:

Explore different feminist and gender theories through independent research

## Tasks:

### Mini Research Project:

Research the following theorists and create an A4 digital or handwritten profile for each.

- a) **bell hooks**
  - Ideas about intersectionality, race, and feminism
  - Belief that feminism is about ending patriarchal oppression
  - Critique of media portrayals of Black women
  
- b) **Van Zoonen**
  - Belief that gender is constructed through media
  - Women's bodies often objectified in patriarchal culture
  - Gender representation changes depending on genre and context
  
- c) **Judith Butler – Gender Performativity**
  - Gender is performed, not innate
  - Norms and repeated behaviours shape identity
  - Media reinforces or challenges these performances
