On Thursday 9th November 2023 the school hosted its annual Presentation Evening and we were delighted that Margaret and Barry Mizen were able to join us as our guest speakers.

Margaret and Barry are a couple who have demonstrated incredible strength and resilience in the face of tragedy and have turned their pain into a powerful force for positive change. Margaret and Barry tragically lost their son, Jimmy, in a senseless act of violence in 2008. Instead of succumbing to bitterness and despair, they chose a path of

compassion and courage to ensure that Jimmy's legacy would be one of positivity and change. Their commitment led to the creation of the <u>Mizen Foundation</u>, dedicated to fostering peace, empowering our youth and creating safer communities for all.

The Mizen Foundation works tirelessly towards these goals by engaging with young people, schools and communities advocating for conflict resolution and spreading messages of forgiveness and non-violence. Their mission is to help all young people to realise their potential and Margaret and Barry have presented talks and inspired so many of our staff and students over the years.

Margaret and Barry received a standing ovation after speaking to 80,000 people at Pope Benedict XVI's Hyde Park Vigil in 2010 and were both appointed Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in the 2014 New Year Honours, for services to young people in London.

As Mr Askin is so fond of saying, as a school we have two main priorities: to keep our students safe, and to have teaching and learning at the heart of everything we do; to do both we need the students in school and that is clearly improving here at the school.

I am delighted that Mr and Mrs Mizen are on the front cover of this newsletter. In over twenty years in education I have had the privilege of meeting many inspirational people, but I can honestly say nobody who is more inspirational than the Mizens. To have gone through the awful tragedy that they have done and continue to share a message of peace, forgiveness and hope is truly moving and inspirational. I am so proud that the Mizens have become such good friends of the school and that a couple who speak at so many high-profile events and countless schools speak so incredibly positively about the students of Ruislip High School and travelled a significant distance to be our guest speakers at this year's presentation evening.

This term also saw our long-awaited Ofsted inspection. I am not yet in a position to share with parents and guardians the report that follows the inspection but can say that the inspectors were incredibly impressed with how our students presented themselves both in lessons and throughout the period the inspectors were at the school. In speaking to the staff and students at the school prior to inspection I emphasised that the external scrutiny was a positive and we should treat the experience as 'our time to shine'. I believe our community did that and I would also like to thank all the parents and guardians who filled in the parent view survey that accompanied the inspection.

Ruislip High School is also part of the Vanguard Learning Trust and I am proud to work in the leadership of a family of schools who are all committed to delivering outstanding, inclusive education to the young people we serve. GEOGRAPHY NEWS



In the autumn term Year 13 students have been writing up their coursework projects from their summer field trip to Norfolk.

Sixth Form

This term started with Year 13s working hard to create very professional-looking documents for their coursework projects. This is a key piece of work with it contributing 20% of the A-Level grade. The projects use first-hand data collected in the summer term field trip to the Norfolk coastline (see photo).

Year 13s then moved on to start the final two topics of the course: Water and Carbon Cycles (physical geography); and Global Systems and Global Governance (human geography).

Meanwhile, Year 12 students have made a super start on their first A-Level topics, Hazards (physical geography) and Changing Places (human geography). In particular, students have used 2021 Census data to research statistics about the local area using the website here:

HISTORY NEWS

Year 7s investigate what happened to Lindow Man

It has been a busy and exciting term for Year 7 as they started their History lessons at Secondary School. Students have been working hard thinking about the ways in which historians make sense of the past. Students studied local history- by measuring the significance of places in Ruislip such as RAF Northolt and the Manor Station. Harry, Year 7 said, "I enjoyed studying how Ruislip has changed over time."

Later, students learned how to make inferences by trying to work out what happened to Lindow Man - the name given to a man whose 2000 year-old preserved body was found in a peat bog in the 1980s. Karina, Year 7 said, "I liked the mystery of Lindow Man as it showed historians can always learn more about the past."

Year 11s visit Notting Hill and Spitalfields

During the second week of November, 2023, our Year 11 students, studying GCSE history, visited Notting Hill and Spitalfields. The purpose of the trip was to help bring elements of history, which students are studying for their upcoming GCSE exams, to life. In particular, their paper which focuses on migration through time.

During the first half of the day, students were given a tour of Notting Hill by one of their history teachers. There, students saw a range of sites, such as Island Studios, where Bob Marley and the Wailers recorded two studio albums; Portobello Road Market; and the site of the Mangrove Restaurant – famous for the 'Mangrove Nine' court case of 1970.



The second half of the day began with lunch at Spitalfields Market - famous for its links to the Huguenot textile industry. Students then had a tour of Spitalfields and the surrounding area, led by former Ruislip High School Deputy Headteacher, Rich. He showed the students Mr remnants of Victorian tenements in Whitechapel, as well as evidence of Bangladeshi Jewish, Huguenot and migration to the area.

Aahana, Year 11, said: "The trip was a great opportunity to gain more insight into history and culture, which will also be beneficial for upcoming assessments."

Kyran, Year 11, added: "It was a great trip. It helped with my knowledge for the migration course."

The history department would like to thank the residents of Whitechapel and Notting Hill, who were happy to share their experiences of migration. Thanks also to Mr Rich for leading a fantastic tour, which will no doubt support the students' understanding of the course.

Finally, well done to all of the students who attended the trip - your behaviour when representing Ruislip High School was consistently outstanding throughout the day.



At the end of November, the Year 13s handed in the final draft of their coursework. Students had to write a 4000 word essay on the Civil Rights Movement in America. They had the choice to explore a theme within that topic. Some students chose a topic that linked to the subjects they hope to study at University,

Jamie, Year 13 said: "I really enjoyed the coursework as it gave me an insight into a side of politics I haven't studied before. I did my coursework on how the role of Presidents improved the lives of African Americans as it links to my ambition to study politics at University. "

Caelan, Year 13 said: "My history coursework allowed me to delve deeper into my passion for law. I chose to focus on the role of the Supreme Court and the impact that court decisions had on the lives of African Americans and their civil rights. I was able to use knowledge from my law A Level and apply it to my essay."

We congratulate the Year 13s on completing a complex and challenging piece of work independently! We wish them the best of luck in their preparations for their PPEs in January 2024."

Computer Science in Action A level Trip

On Wednesday the 29th November 2023, twelve A level Computer Science students attended Computer Science in Action, accompanied by Mrs Poddar and Ms Bonny, held at the picturesque Emmanuel Centre.

The day consisted of four intriguing lectures that explored the different avenues that Computer Science could take us in. This event was hosted by Matthew Leeke, a renowned Professor in Computer Science at University of Birmingham.

The first speaker was Katrina Dargel, an experienced Lead UX Researcher, Workshop Facilitator, and Speaker, globally, specialising in uniting product design and strategy. She has worked with major companies like Ford and Airbus, and now helps executives and leaders enhance their product development. She gave a very engaging talk about Navigating UX Design: From Basics to Growth Mindset.She explored the User interface design process and explained how "thinking outside the box" has led to growth in the process beyond our imagination. She also discussed the ethical considerations of the UX design.

Then, Matthew Leeke showed how state-of-the-art machine learning algorithms and the smart devices we use daily can solve some huge societal problems and be used to design smart cities.

After this, there was a special session by Dr Nic Harrigan, a physicist with PsiQuantum, on Quantum computing which explored how computing has forever changed the world, and what we are capable of as a species: from arguing across the world, to making Harry Potter fashionable. But equally important applications remain fundamentally impossible for traditional computers. Nic explained how Quantum computers are able to change this, by processing information in entirely new ways.

After lunch, we had an informative talk giving exam tips and tricks to help us with our Computing A-Level. This was followed by a lecture about Behind the Scenes of App Development by Lyndsey Scott, who is a software engineer and coding educator.


The Autumn term is long but so much has been achieved. I wish everyone a Merry Christmas and restful Christmas break. Happy New year and look forward to the start of the Spring term.

SCIENCE NEWS

KS3 Science

The students have done extremely well to settle into Science lessons this term. All have completed the spring assessment and teacher assessed tasks as well as having participated in lots of different exciting practicals. All were engaged with the curriculum and enjoyed learning new concepts and ideas, such as making electromagnets and the model of an atom. As always the Science Department has been encouraging students to investigate and draw new conclusions from our Let's Think Science lessons on making relationships and Hooke's Law.



KS5 Science

The biologists have completed a number of dissection experiments this term with the highlight being a locust dissection. The students did this incredibly professionally and managed to see the trachea and tracheoles of the locust using a light microscope.

Air pollution monitors

The students that are part of Ecoclub took part in a study by Asthma and Lung UK to monitor air pollution on the school site. We set up air pollution monitors close to the road and further away from the road in the student social areas to see if there was a difference in the levels of pollution. The results have been returned to us and the air pollution levels in and around the school site are all below the minimum safe levels which is great news.

During the workshop, our facilitator Nathaniel explored heavy topics such as: what is masculinity? The Maths Challenge consisted of five diverse rounds, each designed to test the participants' mathematical mettle. These rounds included a variety of engaging topics, including the renowned "24 game." In this beloved game, contestants are presented with four individual numbers and are tasked with combining them, using addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, to craft the elusive double-digit number 24.

And did you manage to uncover the solution? Here's the step-by-step breakdown:

5 x 5 = 25 4 - 3 = 1 25 - 1 = 24



The subsequent rounds tested the students' skills in Financial Mathematics; UKMT questions; Problem Solving, and concluded with a round inspired by the popular TV show, "The 1% Club."


As always, we have so many entries for our photography competition with the theme of 'Caring' with our top three shown here.
