Equalities Week

The students had lots of fun learning this new skill and took part in the workshop enthusiastically.

During the sessions, mostly led by Ms Poddar, the students gained new cooking skills, inspiring them to try a new dish at home. As we come to the end of another incredibly busy term, I wanted to take a moment to thank parents and guardians for all of their continued support this year. I know I speak for all of the staff at the school in saying that we see education very much as a partnership and for our students to achieve to the very best of their potential it is vital that school and home work together. I was so pleased this week to hear that as part of our half term thank you week students had written e-cards to members of staff and over nine hundred postcards

had been sent from RHS students. I have made a point of thanking students this week in their celebration assemblies as I know these small tokens have been hugely appreciated by the staff and again I believe it is testament to the culture we have at the school and why I am so proud to lead our school community.

One of the highlights of my role is that I get to show visitors around our wonderful building and this term I have had the pleasure of welcoming Members of Parliament from both Labour and Conservative political parties. I recognise the concern but would only add that the aim of the cultural dress day was to raise awareness of the different minority cultures that exist in our school and to hear students explaining the significance of their dress was a real highlight of the term for me. I have no doubt there are lessons to be learnt but what I would say is that here at the school we do not shy away from having such conversations. Sometimes we won't always get this right, but it is important that all our students feel listened to and understood. As someone who grew up in a very monocultural part of the country, I am immensely proud to lead the diverse community that makes up Ruislip High School and will stand by what I have said many times; there is more that unites us than divides us.

It has been an exceptionally busy sporting term for our students and I enjoyed hearing all about the various successes of our Year 8 sports teams in their celebration assembly this week. GEOGRAPHY NEWS


Year 7 Geography


In this topic, Year 7s have also studied the incredible 1911-12 race to the South Pole. Before this, students studied the successful 1953 British Mount Everest expedition, and completed an assessment on Map Skills and the British Isles. Year 8 then moved on to study the world's changing population, including that India's population overtook China's population in 2023. 
GEOGRAPHY NEWS (CONTINUED)

Year 9 Geography

The students have studied the Globalisation and Earning a Living topic, which included an investigation into the environmental impacts of 'fast fashion'. This was followed by 'Superpower Geography' where students considered which countries are considered among the most important in the world, using data such as military spending. Year 9s also completed a study of South America by investigating the reasons behind deforestation in the Amazon region. They particularly enjoyed learning about how the Brazilian government rainforest police squad, Ibama, tries to tackle illegal deforestation.

GCSE Geography

The department always recommends students revise in an active way, for example creating 'mind maps' using words, numbers, colours and images to help knowledge 'stick'. Here are some example mind maps, created by Deveshi ahead of the recent Year 10 exam.

Students in Year II have demonstrated the Ruislip High value of perseverance to reach the end of the GCSE course and start the revision phase with enthusiasm. They have also been studying this year's Paper 3 pre-release booklet on how to address the UK's housing shortage. Year IIs are using the department's 'Megabook' revision guides. These are also on the online Google Classrooms, along with several past exam papers and revision quizzes. Meanwhile, students in Year 10 are looking forward to a field trip to Hengistbury Head on the south coast in June 2024.

A-level Geography

Year 13 students have completed their ambitious coursework projects, based on their residential field trip to Norfolk last year. Year 13 students have also been working towards completing the A-level course with topics such as 'Water and Carbon Cycles' and 'Global Systems and Global Governance'. The department wishes the students well for their public exams ahead. Year 12 students have made pleasing progress on 'Coastal Systems and Landscapes' and 'Resource Security'. The department is looking forward to taking Year 12 students on a 4-day residential field trip to the Norfolk coast in June 2024.

HISTORY NEWS

Year 7 Castle Project

This term saw year 7 students get the opportunity to bring out their creative side with a long term project to build their one Motte and Bailey castle. William the Conqueror famously built seven hundred castles to ensure the subjugation of the Saxon population. However, none of those were made from cardboard, lego or even chocolate cake! Many students also decided to create castles online – Minecraft was the favoured platform for some including Diyan, Noarii and Ben, who



said, "It collectively took us about four hours to make our castle, but we enjoyed doing it. It was different to most homework tasks because we were able to complete a project with the freedom of using a platform that for us is fun to use."

Year 8 visit the British Museum

On February 9th, students who had been nominated by the History and Geography departments travelled to central London and to the British museum. Students spent the afternoon exploring a wealth of different exhibits, some of which covered topics from the history curriculum such as Norman England.

Tegan said, "I saw lots of interesting things that I had never seen before. We had a booklet and had to locate items and write about what we found." While Erin said, "In the money room there were lots of coins from different time periods, including from dynasties of China. We had to look for one specific coin and it took us about ten minutes since there were so many in the room to search through!" She went on to say, "the chess board from the 1100s was especially interesting as it was from so long ago and the pieces were detailed sculptures of people."

Year 10

The history department continues to be impressed with how hard our Year 10s have been working to develop their skills and understanding of their GCSE units. Our year 10 cohort have now finished learning about Weimar and Nazi Germany, and have begun studying the Cold War. Laylah, Year 10, said, *"I have really enjoyed learning about life in Nazi Germany – especially how they used the media to manipulate and influence peoples' views."* We wish them all a restful Easter break following their PPEs.

SCIENCE NEWS


KS3 science





During STEAM which is a week-long celebration of science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics (Monday 11th- Friday 15th March) students partook in a number of 'fun events' alongside some science related career activities. Year 7 students learnt about forensics and looked at techniques such as chromatography, fingerprinting, DNA fingerprinting and blood splatter analysis. Year 8 completed an engineering challenge building spaghetti bridges and Year 9 considered how life exists in the most extreme environments.





KS4 science



During STEAM week Year 10 students learnt about genetic disorders and considered the difficulties faced by individuals and their families. As part of this week the students watched 'Five Feet Apart', a film about two young people living with cystic fibrosis.

KS5 science

The Year 12 chemists entered the Royal Society of Chemistry's prestigious Olympiad competition. Pictured are some of the students just before starting the first round exam. The competition is renowned for being exceptionally challenging as some of the questions require answers beyond the current A level specification. The students from RHS attained three certificates!





Year 12 biologists have shown exemplary work ethic this academic year and are doing exceptionally well with their required practicals. During the spring term the students completed the aseptic technique microbiology practical where they grew a culture of bacteria on a petri dish and tested the effectiveness of a variety of antibiotics. The group pictured above found exclusion zones where the bacillus bacteria had been killed around the antibiotics C (chloramphenicol) and T (tetracycline).

EcoHub

A number of Year 7 ecohelpers have been helping us get the Ecohub ready for spring and summer by planting bluebells under the silver birch and spreading wildflower seed. It has been lovely watching the birds use the space in the early morning to have a drink from the pond.



STEAM Week encouraged our students to think critically, collaborate with their peers, and approach problems with creativity and resilience. It fostered a love for learning and exploration, igniting a passion for STEAM subjects that will continue to inspire our students in the future.

This year the students of following schools took part:

UKMT Intermediate MATHS Challenge 2023 - 2024

On Wednesday, January 31st, 2024, Ruislip High School buzzed with mathematical energy as Year 10 and Year 11 students eagerly participated in the prestigious United Kingdom Mathematics Trust (UKMT) Intermediate challenge. This annual event, renowned for its rigorous 60-minute, multiple-choice format, serves as a platform to foster mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in fundamental mathematical techniques traits that are essential for tackling intriguing problems.

A remarkable 180 students from Ruislip High School's Year 10 and Year 11 cohorts proudly represented their institution, pitting their skills against counterparts from schools across the UK.

Under the diligent guidance of the Mathematics department and the industrious organisation by Ms. Jani's Above & Beyond club, students received comprehensive preparation both within the classroom and through supplementary resources. Past paper questions and advanced materials, curated with care, were made accessible on Google Classroom, allowing students to sharpen their skills even beyond school hours.

The results of our students were nothing short of spectacular. Fueled by a spirit of healthy competition and armed with their mathematical prowess, Ruislip High School students achieved remarkable feats. This year's cohort continued the tradition of excellence, with four students from Year 10 and Year 11 earning coveted Gold Certificates, while 15 and 35 students secured Silver and Bronze certificates, respectively, for their outstanding performance in the Intermediate Mathematics Challenge.

The exhilaration was palpable as the results were announced during the celebratory assembly. Participation in such challenges not only reflects the high aspirations and dedication of our students but also serves as invaluable preparation for the rigours of GCSE and A-Level Mathematics examinations, as well as competitive university entrance assessments.

On Tuesday 5th March 106 Year 9 students attended the Languages Breakfast which started before school and ran into Period 1. The Breakfast was hosted by the fifteen fantastic and newly appointed Year 10 Language Ambassadors who all study a language for GCSE. Students were able to sample a range of French and Spanish breakfast foods. The French breakfast selection included croissants, pains au chocolat, madeleines, crêpes, orange juice and hot chocolate. Churros with chocolate sauce, potato omelette, serrano ham and chorizo as well as toasted bread with tomato were on offer for the Spanish selection.
