I did want to acknowledge that the beginning of this term was affected by tragedy with the untimely deaths of two members of our community. Our thoughts continue to go

out to the families and friends of the two boys and I would like to acknowledge the resilience of our Year 11 students in particular regarding how they dealt with such tragic news.

Rather than the customary Ruislip High School activities week that has been a feature of the past two summer terms, this year we launched an even more ambitious activities programme that saw trips, activities and alternative timetable days operating over a number of weeks at the end of term. The idea was to spread the activities out over a longer period in order to give staff and students more time to recover following feedback that had been received last year. As you can see from this newsletter the activities programme provided more opportunities than ever at the school.

Our intention for next year is to do even more to ensure there is a coordinated extended curriculum offer at Ruislip High School available throughout the academic year. ### **GEOGRAPHY NEWS**

The Geography Department has been pleased to organise field trips in the summer term for Year 10 and Year 12 students. Meanwhile, Year 8 students have carried out fieldwork on the school site.

#### **GCSE Geography**

In June 2024, Year 10 students were interested to see the large-scale coastal engineering works taking place at Hengistbury Head in Dorset. This was part of the GCSE Geography field trip to the south coast. Read more about the erosion management works at the website <u>here</u>. Students had two enquiry questions, based on human and physical Geography, to help prepare them for GCSE Paper 3 which they will sit in the summer of 2025.












Meanwhile, Year 11 students showed superb effort as they revised for their public exams. ### GEOGRAPHY NEWS (CONTINUED)

#### A-level Geography

Assessment of A-level Geography is challenging, with two 2.5-hour exams (Physical Geography and Human Geography). The department was impressed with students' approach to the revision period. This year the students faced exam questions on areas including water resource management, and how changes in the carbon cycle might affect tropical storms. Good luck for results day!

The department visited the Norfolk coastline for a four-day residential field trip in June with Year 12 students. The aim of the visit was for students to collect data for their NEA (non-exam assessment) coursework projects. In Cromer, students and staff were interested to see a £25m project under way to bolster the sea defences.




### GEOGRAPHY NEWS (CONTINUED)

#### Key Stage 3 Geography

Students in Years 7-9 have continued to show a positive attitude towards the subject, and the department is looking forward to teaching more than 115 students starting GCSE Geography as Year 10s in September. Year 9 students have investigated the Geography of transport conflicts this term. For example, they have deliberated the plan for a new cruise ship port on the island of Grand Cayman, and also studied the latest HS2 map with the high-speed rail track now ending in Birmingham.

Year 8s have investigated weather and climate, including collecting weather data around the school site. Their data was then compared to the climatic average and the Met Office forecast for the day. Year 8s have also studied how climate meetings such as COP26 aim to help slow down global warming. Meanwhile, in the 'Ecosystems and Biodiversity' topic, Year 7 students have studied plant and animal adaptations for environments including hot deserts and tropical rainforests. Year 7s have also studied the development of Ruislip over time, using historical Ordnance Survey maps.

### **HISTORY NEWS**

The History Department said farewell to Years 11 and 13 over the last few weeks. We are pleased to hear that some will be reading History at university and that many of our Year 11 students will return to study History in the Sixth Form.

The summer term saw a busy schedule for the History Department as we embarked on a number of trips around London. On Friday, 5th July, Year 12 travelled to Central London. There they visited the Tower of London, and the 'Six Lives' exhibition at the National Portrait Gallery. At the Tower an excellent tour guide challenged our A-Level students with pertinent questions based on the primary sources that are on display around the Tower.

After a quick lunch stop, students visited an exhibition showcasing sources based around the lives of Henry's six wives. There they saw a number of items on offer including the first Bible to be written in English, to the costumes used in the musical 'The Six.'



On Tuesday, 9th July the department was pleased to lead a trip which saw all of our Year 8s visit Hampton Court Palace as part of the school's 'Above and Beyond' month. Here, students experienced a range of interesting activities. First, they visited the kitchens which would have assembled the great banquets held in the Tudor era. Later students visited the Tudor apartments themselves – home to the Great Hall, and the corridors leading to Henry VIII's chapel. Famously, it is thought Henry's fourth wife Katherine Howard is said to haunt one of these passages where she pleaded with her husband to spare her life. Thankfully no students reported seeing an apparition. The day also included attempting to conquer the oldest surviving hedge maze in England, commissioned by William III.

# **SCIENCE NEWS**

The summer term has been another busy one for the Science Department. The most exciting day of the term was the Year 7 Science 'Love Learning' day. Our students took part in a variety of workshops to get them thinking about the world around them and their impact on the world. The day started with a talk from one of our ex-students Brandon Querioz from The Marine Conservation Society. The talk was very thought provoking and our students asked some excellent questions at the end of it.

The students completed a variety of workshops including: a session about our bees and our beehive; an insect hunt using pooters and butterfly nets; a lesson about plastics; a session on the role of zoos in conservation and providing necessary enrichment for animals and an animal handling and animal adaptations workshop. A lot of fun was had

### **YEAR 9 NEWS**

The summer term sees the end of KS3 for Year 9. After an intense start to the year with Citizenship PPE's and the serious decisions around Option Choices for GCSE, the summer term, aside from End of Year exams, has been much more relaxed. I have been consistently proud of the mature way in which Year 9 have prepared and conducted themselves in the formal situations they have found themselves in this year. Many students have been rewarded for their excellent attendance and behaviour in school throughout the year and hopefully have enjoyed the variety of trips they have participated in. Also, well done to those Year 9 students that have started their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award, and we look forward to more trips and extra-curricular activities next year.

A number of our Year 9 students will soon be invited to take part in the Higher Project Qualification. The HPQ is designed to help students broaden their thinking and provides the opportunity for students to pursue a topic or activity that they have a particular interest in. The group, led by Ms Ohana, will choose a range of exciting and challenging topics from: exploring zero emissions travel; the media's portrayal of the LGBTQ+ community; the reliability of human memory and exploring the link between mental health and music.This project has been running for a number of years and we are incredibly excited to see how all of the projects develop over the next academic year.

The Year 9 Robotics Workshop was an engaging and interactive experience designed to introduce students to the exciting world of robotics. The workshop aimed to cultivate students' interest in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) fields and foster their problem-solving skills through hands-on activities and experimentation with robots. Students learned about the components of a robot, including the sensors. In small groups, students were provided with robotics kits containing basic components such as motors, wheels, and sensors. Guided by instructors, students assembled their own simple robots, learning about circuits, programming, and mechanical design in the process. Urrav Macwan 9S said, "I really enjoyed the workshop. It gave us the chance to create our own robot that can complete simple tasks." At the end of the workshop, students engaged in a reflective discussion where they shared their experiences, challenges faced, and lessons learned. They also discussed the real-world applications of robotics and potential career paths in STEM fields.

I would also like to thank parents/carers for their support throughout the year and I look forward to continuing to work with you next year. Students have adjusted very well to the KS4 timetable and are in a good position to start their GCSEs.

In Year 7 mathematics, using stickers as rewards for effort and achievement has had a significant impact on engagement and performance. The students love receiving stickers, which provide immediate positive reinforcement and encourage active participation.

Stickers foster a sense of accomplishment boosting confidence and pride, and creating a positive classroom atmosphere. They also help develop a growth mindset, where challenges are seen as opportunities This approach to learn and improve. cultivates perseverance and resilience, enhancing both mathematical skills and valuable life skills. Consistent use of rewards inspires students to reach their full potential and enjoy learning mathematics.



#### **Maths Clinic**

The Maths Clinic will be running in the new year on Thursdays from 8am to 8.25am.

The maths clinic is designed to cater to students of all years, providing a supportive and dynamic environment for learning. It includes homework assistance, problemsolving practice and enrichment activities.

The maths clinic has shown students improve their academic performance and enhanced problem-solving skills as well as their confidence in their abilities, making them more comfortable with tackling maths-related tasks both in and out of the classroom.

#### How to enroll:

Students and parents interested in the Maths Clinic can sign up online or inform their maths teacher that they will be attending the maths clinic so that work can be prepared for them.

# **YEAR 12 WORK EXPERIENCE**

From Monday 10th June, 2024, Year 12 undertook a week of work experience to explore life in the workplace, as a part of their post-18 enrichment. A record number of Year 12 students completed work experience placements at a range of local employers.

All students had the opportunity to engage with a company on a week-long placement, developing contacts and skills that will support their future job, university and apprenticeship applications. Placements spanned a huge range of professions and industries, including pharmacies, law firms, property management and production companies. A range of experiences are outlined below:

Tanay completed a placement at APCOA Parking. He said: "I was in the finance department and with the help of the people working in finance, I was taught about how finance works, how it is managed and the different sectors in the industry. We also had a day in Heathrow where we looked at how APCOA practically works, such as valet parking and the parking control room."

Mia completed a placement at a media production company, Gravity Media. She shared her reflections: "I really enjoyed the variety of work I got to do. I learned about the playbacks in football, the highlights in tennis and the production processes undertaken to create them for the screen. The team always looked out for me and included me in their work, even during their lunch break."

A number of students also took up placements at local primary schools, including those of our Trust Partners. Ava-Pearl said: "This work experience was an amazing opportunity for me to step out of my comfort zone, take part in activities I would never usually get involved with and speak to people I never would have thought of talking to. I had the most amazing time whilst I was there, bonding with the students, and making good connections with the teachers. The overall experience was very nostalgic as Field End was my primary school, so it was a privilege to return and give something back to them."

The sixth form team has received some outstanding feedback from a range of employers who gave our students access to placements. We are incredibly proud of all of the students for their effort and conduct during these placements. Well done.

Thank you to all the employers and their staff teams who supported with facilitating these placements, and to Ms Bonny, our Placement Coordinator, for ensuring that our students can continue to access these invaluable opportunities.


#### THE CREATIVE CORNER




#### Year 7 Logo competition


