The summer term has been a busy time for the history department. Our Year 7 historians have been learning about the Crusades and Islamic Civilisations. Mr Maud's Year 7 students have been very creative in their project homework making videos using stop animation, Flipa Clip and filming themselves.

we are aware of how important it is for our students to experience history outside of the classroom and we are looking forward to our first trip abroad in three years. Finally, the department would like to congratulate our Year 11 and Year 13 students on completing their public examinations. The students have impressed us with their focus, resilience and determination. We would like to wish you all a restful break and we look forward to continuing our historical journey in September.

There were three rounds, with each round increasing in

difficulty, including double digits, fractions and decimals. As the event got underway, there was a real air of competition, as each team of two whispered suggestions of the solutions to each other. Ruislip High School was represented by Amelia S, Lorena M, Harley B and Tarik D.

Queensmead took the first prize, Vyners the second prize, with Bishop Ramsey coming third. Ruislip High came in fifth place. There were no sore losers – everyone had an enjoyable time with students asking if they could compete again next year.





# **SCIENCE NEWS**



### **Cultural Capital Day**

On Monday 4th July the science department put on a Science Day for Year 8/9 students as part of the Cultural Capital Day. The students undertook a day of practical workshops exploring the reactivity of metals. The day started with some exciting demo's from Mr Collins and Mrs Modi that included the 'acid bomb' and hydrogen balloon. Later in the day, students conducted their own independent experiments and recorded their results. Staff who supervised the day reported the students loved all the practicals and showed off all their scientific thinking skills.

#### Science magic show

The following Monday was an extra special treat for students in Year 7, 8 and 9 as Dr Pritchard from 'Science Magic Shows' came to give our students a show. The money provided for this activity came

from the Jack Petchey fund and we are incredibly grateful to be able to give this opportunity to our students. The students learnt about centre of mass and density in a fun and interactive way. The aim of the session was to ensure students recognised the need to ask questions and not accept observations on face value.

#### **Classroom based practicals**

As always the science department has been encouraging students to investigate and draw conclusions on their own. Below is a picture of one lesson where students investigated the



effect of weight on the extension of a spring. The students had to record their results in a table and then write a conclusion based on the results they gathered.

#### **Physics interns**

In addition to the variety of exciting activities detailed above, the science department has been lucky enough to host two physics interns through the Ogden Trust physics intern programme. The interns have been learning about what it is like to be a science teacher and have been supporting lessons and clubs here at RHS. During their time with us they have presented a university workshop to all Year 9 students to give them a flavour of the future opportunities available to them. The interns have also taught their own very first lesson with Year 7 students. We wish them the very best of luck in the final year of their physics degrees and certainly hope they end up opting to complete teacher training in a year's time!

# **GEOGRAPHY NEWS**

The Geography Department has been delighted to organise a brand new day field trip for Year 10 students in the summer term. This is in addition to continuing the long-established residential field trip for A-level students.

#### **GCSE Geography**

The new GCSE field trip for 2022 has been to take Year 10 classes to Hengistbury Head on the south coast. Students had two enquiry questions to help prepare for the GCSE Paper 3 they will sit in the summer of 2023. These were: 1: Does Hengistbury Head have effective coastal management? 2: Does Mudeford Spit attract tourism?

Mason in Year 10 said, "It was interesting to measure the beach either side of the Long Groyne structure which protects Hengistbury Head and also places to the west such as Bournemouth. It was a clear, sunny day so we could see all the way to the chalk Needles on the Isle of Wight as well."

Grace added, "We noticed how the main groyne coastal defence was under a major reconstruction project with large diggers, because of concerns about sea level rise."

Liberty said, "I would 100% recommend this field trip to younger students. The walk was challenging but we got to take the land train back to our starting point from Mudeford Spit."

Anastasia said, "The best bits for me were the view over the English Channel, and also seeing the beach huts which we learnt can cost over £300,000."

Luke added, "Before getting to Hengistbury Head, we stopped off at Barton On Sea to assess the effects of coastal change over recent decades. Coastal management is a serious business affecting peoples' lives."

### Students enjoying the Year 10 Geography field trip to Hengistbury Head

Year 10 students have already completed four of the eight GCSE topics (The Challenge of Natural Hazards, Living World, Physical Landscapes in the UK, and Urban Issues and Challenges). Year 10 students can do some early GCSE revision over the summer using their Paper 1 revision 'Megabook' available on Google Classroom. Meanwhile, the department has been pleased with the revision effort displayed by Year 11 students. The department wishes all GCSE students well for results day, and hopes to see many of them in the new Year 12 A-level class from September!

### **A-level Geography**

In June, the department organised another residential field trip to the Norfolk coast for Year 12 students. This visit has taken place every year since 2012, with the exception of 2020 due to the pandemic. The photos show students studying Cromer, known as the "gem of the Norfolk coast", and also Bacton gas terminal which is a crucial location for national energy security.

The department has also been impressed with the level of revision undertaken by Year 13 students for the public exams. In May and June, students undertook two 2.5-hour exams on the six A-level topics: Hazards, Coastal Systems and Landscapes, and Water and Carbon Cycles for physical geography; and Changing Places, Global Systems and Global Governance, and Resource Security for human geography. ### Key Stage 3 Geography

Students in Years 7-9 have continued to show enthusiasm in class. Year 7s have completed the Settlement topic, where they used historic Ordnance Survey maps to study the growth of Ruislip linked to the expansion of the London Underground. Year 7 have also studied Coasts and Oceans, where they have considered the importance of container ship transport in the modern world economy.

Year 8 topics have included investigating energy resources in the UK and how this links to the country's ambition to help with the COP26 climate change meeting targets. They have also studied how the European Union has changed since Brexit.

Year 9 topics have included 'Superpower Geography', in particular investigating which countries challenge the USA as the world's most important country. The final topic of term for Year 9s has been the growth of the tourism industry. One key case study has been to consider if tourism is sustainable in the Galapagos Islands.

Lastly, the department is very pleased to be welcoming five new Year 10 classes in September following the Year 9 subject preferences process. Let's Geog-on!

# YEAR 12 NEWS

As I write this update towards the end of the summer term, it seems incredible that Year 12 are already halfway through their time in the Sixth Form. They have already achieved an enormous amount, especially considering what a very busy summer term this has been. I was particularly impressed with the outstanding attendance and conduct of the students during their PPE week at the end of June, during which they were a credit to themselves and the school. Results from those PPEs will be released at the end of term via a tracking report.

Alongside their studies, the Year 12s have continued to be involved to an impressive extent in the wider life of the school. At the time of writing, we are nearing the end of our first Activities Week since 2019. Students have participated in a TalktheTalk workshop (which developed their presentation and interview skills), the whole school House Values day, Sponsored 10K walk and our post-18 applications drafting day (during which students drafted a UCAS personal statement or apprenticeships cover letter and CV). In June, students interested in apprenticeships attended an ASK Apprenticeships workshop in school, and prospective medics attended an inspirational talk from two trainee neurosurgeons about getting into medicine. The week beginning Monday 11th July will see the Year 12s run the school's annual RAG (Raising and Giving) week.

Throughout Year 12, I have been impressed with the maturity and focus with which the students have conducted themselves and their studies. Looking forward to the start of Year 13, there will inevitably be a strong focus on post-18 applications and revision. I have no doubt that students will use the post-18 evidence that they have been building throughout this academic year to great effect in writing strong applications to universities and apprenticeships, and I am excited to see their successes next year.

A special part of the Sixth Form experience at Ruislip High is hearing from external speakers once a fortnight. Each talk is based around one of the '3Cs' of careers, current affairs and culture. In the summer term this programme has continued, with one of the highlights being a visit from a major energy company figure.

On Thursday 21st April the guest speaker was Chris O'Shea (pictured). Chris is Group Chief Executive of Centrica Energy, which is the parent company of British Gas. Chris has been on BBC Radio 5 this year talking about energy price concerns, and has also been the main guest on Deborah Meaden's 'Big Green Money Show' podcast.

Chris emphasised that he was more interested in students' questions than speaking about his own career. He talked about the future of fossil fuel exploration, developing battery storage for electricity from wind farms, heat pumps, and his concerns over mining resources for electric car batteries. Students



asked questions on areas including fuel poverty, climate change, home heating systems, electric cars and apprenticeship opportunities at Centrica.

Guest speakers in the summer term have also included Sue Alexander from the charity WaterAid, and two school alumni: Lewis Baldry who now works as a Digital Technology Solutions Degree Apprentice with BT; and James Lewington, a former RHS Head Student who is now a primary school teacher.


