Ruislip High fielded 30 pupils from Year 9 and 10, all competing are listed below. All students were a credit to the school, both in competition and in appearance, amongst other schools in the borough.

Alex L (10W) got Ruislip off to a flying start winning the 800m in a straight final. Alex dictated the tempo early and stuck to his own plan, allowing others to press ahead without them getting too far ahead. Within the second lap, Alex put his foot down and controlled the race from there, finishing comfortably ahead at 2 minutes, 23 seconds.

Anna B (10B) competed in the 300m race: she finished second comfortably in her first heat and then prevailed victoriously in the final with a time of 46.84. Congratulations Anna on a fantastic final!



The Year 9s competing in their first senior event also started strong with Zoe M (9B) competing and winning gold in the Javelin. She threw at a distance of 22.85m, well done!

Jake H (9F) running in the daunting 85m hurdles made light work of the competition showing his composure at each hurdle and winning gold by a time of 12.84.

Teighan G (9F) competed in the 200m and won gold in the high jump event. Her jump of 1.40m was a clear winner to the runner up at 1.36m.

Jaydon DB (9D) who competed in the 200m, won gold in the long jump with a best jump of 4.82m. He certainly enjoyed his victory.



Sam W (10F), a returning gold winner in the discus last year, settled for silver this time, missing out on gold by 1 metre with a throw of 21.12m. A fantastic effort from a reliable pupil who gives 100% in everything he tries!

Joe K (10C) ran in the 1500m: he is usually dominating on the football pitch, but here, he controlled 99% of the race. It was a superb effort and in his attempt to secure the gold, he stretched ahead in the final lap to create a gap, but in the last 150m, a sprint finish started in which he agonisingly lost out by 3 tenths of a second. His recorded time was 4 minutes 41.54 seconds. A great effort and he would come back later in the day for more.



## Tragic Deaths of Horses at The Grand National

To the public's dismay, three horses have died in the Grand National 2023. Even more horrendous, however, is that since the first race in 1893, 89 horses have died. The names of the fallen horses of Grand National 2023 are as follows: Envoye Special, Dark Raven, and Hill Sixteen.

PetaUK calls horse racing "Gambling On Animals' Lives", and it is rightly said. They advocate about how horses don't become thrilled at crossing the finish line, and are "whipped into submission and end each race sweating and exhausted". Many organisations for animal welfare are outraged and ome are taking action, such as the League for Cruel Sports, which is calling for tighter safety, or the RSPCA, which is also calling for the field that is raced in to be reformed.

In addition, last year, no less than 4 horses died at the Aintree Festival, another popular horse racing contest. So, this problem isn't just with the Grand National, but many other horse racing events. PetaUK informs us that, "[a]pproximately 200 horses die a year on British race tracks", and considering that 700 - 800 racehorses die a year, this is a huge problem.

Many protesters were arrested at the race, some protesters managing to breach the race track. Animal Aid's opinion of this race is that "[t]he Grand National is a deliberately hazardous race. Since 2000, 33 horses have died on the Grand National course and, over the course of the three-day meeting, 55 horses have been killed in that same period." Many people agree with this opinion.



This is a brutal slaughter, and even if this won't be banned, regulations must be put in place to protect these beautiful creatures, who take no joy in these races. This is purely for human entertainment, and it *must* be stopped.

## National Strikes Disrupt More than Just School Days

From June 2022, after the members of the National Union of Rail and Transport Workers (RMT) voted to strike over planned changes to their pay and working conditions, the union members across the country took part in strikes that led to widespread disruptions.

In addition to the transport strikes, the HCSA - the hospital doctors' union - and teachers' union - the National Education Union - voted to strike for similar reasons. It's clear that the problem across the country has a very big impact on the workers.

This all started because of the rising inflation and demands for pay increases that would keep peace with this inflation. The strikes consisted of people not working, for example doctors and teachers not going to work. Because of the strikes, people had to wait hours at the Ambulance & Emergency department, and students lost and they are still losing many hours and days of school and learning time.

When people don't go to work, they usually attend protests. At these protests, people chant and call for the government to change. They also feature guest speakers who plead for change as well. Spanning a few hours, the protests take up most of a morning and afternoon.

### When will this stop or end?

This could actually never stop, but the only way that it is going to stop is when people will be paid and be appreciated more for their hard work.

Currently, the negotiations are being held between the government and the unions. For example, the doctors' union have not achieved their goal, for the moment.

Also, the teachers' union are still unhappy with the government's proposals and want to re-vote for further strike actions.

#### Will strikes affect GCSE students?

No, the strikes will not affect students that have their exams this year because schools stay partially open for Year 11 and all the other years that have important exams. Additionally, by this point in the year, the Year 11s should have covered all their content, at least at Ruislip High! However, as students, some enjoy their day off and some don't.

Overall, this is a clear problem that might last longer than expected if the government doesn't respond to the needs of the people.

## The King's Coronation

As you all may be aware, our Queen Elizabeth II, the longest-reigning monarch, who reigned since 6th February 1952, sadly passed away on the 8th of September 2022. This meant that our country no longer had a queen or a king. The next person to rule the country was, of course, her oldest son, Prince Charles III out of her four children. He became king on the day his mother died. However, due to the country being in mourning, the ceremony of his coronation was postponed to allow the country to properly have the services and respect that her reign deserved.

A few months after the Queen died, it had been announced that the coronation of the new King would be on 6th May 2023 at Westminster Abbey. Also on 8th May, there was going to be a Bank Holiday to celebrate the King's Coronation. However, this is not only the coronation of the King but also the coronation of Camilla, the new Queen Consort.

### Who is King Charles III?

King Charles III was born on 14 November 1948 at Buckingham Palace, London, during the reign of his grandfather George VI. In 1981 KIng Charles III married Diana, Princess of Wales and shortly after in 1982 they had their first son Prince William. Then, in 1984 they had their second son Prince Henry (commonly known as Prince Harry).

However in 1996 the couple divorced, and a year later Diana tragically died in a car accident in France. A few years later, on the 9th of April, 2005, Charles married Camilla in a civil ceremony at Windsor GuildHall.

In his life King Charles the III has done many positive things for the country, including a lot of charity work and he also helped the environment.

In addition, the money will change, as now we have Queen Elizabeth II on them, but because she is no longer Queen the money will change with the new king's face on them.



### Who attended the Coronation?

Almost everyone in the royal family attended the coronation, all the extended cousins and grandchildren. Even Prince Louis was there. He stole the show because of his childish extravagances - the hand motions, the reactions, and the telling offs from his mother!

However, the only person that did not attend was the Duchess of Sussex, Meghan, who said that she will remain with her children in California. Interestingly, Prince Harry was there, but he did not stay for that long.

Other guests including Katy Perry and Lionel Richie were invited to sing at the concert after the coronation. Surprisingly, other celebrities, such as Adele and Harry Styles, rejected the King's invitation to the ceremony and the concert.

## Do You Know What the Main Women's Rights Are?

What do we mean when we talk about women's rights? What are we fighting for? This article outlines just some examples of the rights which activists throughout the centuries and today have been fighting for.



### Women's Suffrage

During the 19th and early 20th centuries people began to protest for the right of women to vote. In 1893, New Zealand became the first country to give women the right to vote on a national level. This movement grew to spread all around the world, and thanks to the efforts of everyone involved in this struggle, today women's suffrage is a right under the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (1979).

However, despite these developments there are still many places around the world where it is very difficult for women to exercise this right. Take <a href="Syria">Syria</a>[1] for example, where women have been effectively cut off from political engagement, including the ongoing peace process.

In Pakistan, although voting is a constitutional right, in some areas women have been effectively prohibited from voting[2] due to powerful figures in their communities using patriarchal local customs to bar them from going to the polls.

And in Afghanistan, authorities recently decided to introduce mandatory photo screening at polling stations, making voting problematic for women in conservative areas, where most women cover their faces in public.

Amnesty International campaigns for all women to be able to effectively participate in the political process.

### Sexual and Reproductive Rights

Everyone should be able to make decisions about their own body. Every woman and girl has sexual and reproductive rights. This means they are entitled to equal access to health services like contraception and safe abortions, to choose if, when, and who they marry, and to decide if they want to have children and if so how many, when and with who

Women should be able to live without fear of gender-based violence, including rape and other sexual violence, female genital mutilation (FGM), forced marriage, forced pregnancy, forced abortion, or forced sterilisation. But there's a long way to go until all women can enjoy these rights. For example, many women and girls around the world are still unable to access safe and legal abortions. In several countries, people who want or need to end pregnancies are often forced to make an impossible choice: put their lives at risk or go to jail.

In <u>Argentina</u>[3], Amnesty International has campaigned alongside grassroots human rights defenders to change the country's strict abortion laws. There have been some major

steps forward, but women and girls are still being harmed by laws which mean they cannot make choices about their own bodies.

Unfortunately, we are still campaigning for more and more rights. Now it might seem like an obvious point, but we cannot have a free and equal society until everyone is free and equal. Until women enjoy the same rights as men, this inequality is everyone's problem.

### Eurovision Song Contest: Controversy around where the next Eurovision Contest is held

Last year, England came second in the well-known music competition, Eurovision, and in first place was the band Ruslana from Ukraine.

This was a major win for Ukraine considering the most recent events affecting the country. Because of the war between Russia and Ukraine, the Eurovision contest was not able to take place in Ukraine and was held in England, more specifically Liverpool. It was chosen because it had the fitting facilities to accommodate large amounts of people.

Inspiringly, this year's Eurovision theme was "united by music", which was influenced by research showing that when people experience music together their hearts synchronise and beat in unison.



Even though Ukraine is going through a difficult period of time, they still participated in the Eurovision song contest with the song "Heart of Steel', performed by Tvorchi. Their song moved people and really represented how strong they are as a country.

#### Some interesting facts about Eurovision include:

- The longest Eurovision song was five minutes and nine seconds long. 'Corde Della Mia Chitarra', the Italian entry from 1957, is the longest Eurovision song on record.
- Twenty-seven different countries have won the contest. Switzerland won the first contest in 1956. The country with the highest number of wins is Ireland, with seven. The only person to have won more than once as a performer is Ireland's Johnny Logan, who performed "What's Another Year" in 1980 and "Hold Me Now" in 1987. This statistic has now changed to include Loreen of Sweden, who has also won twice now.

This year, during the Eurovision contest, Sweden won again, after also winning in 1974 with the iconic Abba singing Waterloo, and more recently in 2015. After Abba won Eurovision in 1974, they became famous around the world and are still famous today. Interestingly, though, this year's winner, Loreen, also won in 2012. This raises questions around the fairness of the competition. Is this really a fair win? Or is it because next year will mark the 50th anniversary of Abba's win?

Another 2019 study found that using social media more than three times a day predicted poor mental health and well-being in teenagers.
