Government Calls for the Ban of this Beloved Dog Breed!

From 31st December 2023, it will be illegal to breed, sell, advertise, re-home, abandon or allow XL Bully Dogs to stray. This decision was made by the UK government due to the high volume of attacks caused by XL 'Bullies' in past years.



Nature is the flowing water that our sorrows drown in; nature is the breeze that seizes our hateful minds; and nature is the green meadow that will replace and replenish the hope we have left for the design of our future. Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans, Queer, Intersex, Asexual +

What you need to know about pronouns and pride! By Lucy (she/her) and Emma (Year 7)

The LGBTQIA+ community has a vast amount of people, with different labels, pronouns and gender identities. But lots of people don't know much about this, so we are here to inform you and answer any questions you may have had.

The Acronym

First let's discuss the acronym, LGBTQIA+. The first one is L, for Lesbian. Lesbians are non-men who are attracted to non- men. Non-men refers to a person who doesn't identify as a man. So, a woman will be attracted to only women, but a genderneutral person can class themselves as lesbian too!

The second letter is G for Gay – probably the one everyone thinks of when they see LGBTQIA+. Gay is usually the word for a non-woman attracted to non-women.

The third letter is B, for Bisexual. Bisexuality is the attraction to 2 or more genders, most of the time man and woman. They can have preferences of which gender they like more or not but this doesn't make a bisexual person less Bisexual.

There are actually more sexualities that fall under the bi-umbrella, like Pansexual, Polysexual and Omnisexual. Pansexual means attraction to all genders, with no preference at all; this can be referred to as genderblind. Polysexual is the attraction to all genders except for specific ones. Omnisexual is the attraction to all genders, but with a preference for any gender/s they choose

Our next one is T, for Transgender. Transgender is when a person will transition from one gender to another. For example, a man could feel more comfortable as a woman and transition to that gender. Same applies with a woman. There are surgeries available for trans people to allow them to feel more comfortable with their bodies. Another identity that falls under this umbrella is nonbinary, gender neutral and gender fluid. Nonbinary people do not feel like they are male or female because they don't want to be trapped by genders binaries.

Q is for Queer. Queer is simply a person in the LGBTQIA+, someone who is not straight (only attracted to the opposite gender) or someone who is a different gender than their birth gender. Also under this category is Gender-Queer, which is any transgender identity that's not male or female.

The I is for Intersex. Intersex people have genitals, chromosomes or reproductive organs that don't fit into a male/female sex binary. They might seem feminine on the outside, but have male genitals. This can be identified at birth, adulthood or later on.

The last one is A. The A is for Asexual, but also for Aromantic, Aroace or Allies. Asexual means no sexual attraction to any gender. They can still have romance in their life but feel sexually attracted to people or desire sexual relations with another person. Aromantic is a bit of sexual attraction. Aroace is a mix of both, so little to no sexual or romantic attraction.

The + is to symbolise all the other gender identities or sexualities, because there are way too many to put in one acronym. However, it is always important to remember to respect someone's identity and how they identify themselves, and ask for someone's preferred pronouns if you're unsure. We hope this article helped clarify some of the terms so that you feel more informed about LGBTQIA+.
