11th November 2018 represented one hundred years since the final guns fell silent on the Western Front and World War I finally came to an end. It was described at the time as: '*the war to end all wars'*; sadly this has not been the case. This term Ruislip High School students have joined the nation in remembrance of, and reflection on, the sacrifice made by soldiers on all sides of the war.

Theme Day

There is a separate article on theme day included in this newsletter. Commemorating World War I was a central theme of the day, as was producing a Ruislip High School version of The Wipers Times; it was a publication originally produced by British soldiers during World War I when they discovered a printing press while fighting at the Battle of Ypres. As the British soldiers pronounced Ypres as Wipers, the Wipers Times was born. As part of theme day, every tutor group from Ruislip High School completed a page of our very own Wipers Times that, just like the original, included annotations and poetry about the war.

As part of theme day, every student also produced a commemorative poppy inscribed with a personal message. These messages, and the poppies that hold them, have been used to form a powerful display created by Ms Hill that can be seen in the atrium of the school.




The ones they left behind

the fallen are buried, that she decided to write, direct, produce and perform in a play entitled: 'The ones they left behind'. The play is a powerful narrative about the human cost of World War I from a female perspective. The strong performances from all of the actors involved was a testament to the hours of practice that they had devoted to rehearsing and performing the play. A number of dignitaries attended the performances and the deputy mayor, Cllr David Yarrow (also one of the local councillors who founded the school), was so impressed with how the school had dealt with the topic of remembrance that he recommended the school invites local veterans from World War II to view the atrium poppy display.

Lucy would be the first to thank Ms Horton for her support throughout the project. Ms Horton was one of the teachers who took part in the Centenary Battlefields expedition and also performed as part of the production.

The government has been committed to providing students and teachers with a framework for deeper learning about the conflict and has, therefore, funded the Battlefields Centenary tours. At the beginning of my career as a history teacher, there were still men alive who had fought in the trenches on the Western Front. The passage of time means that this is no longer the case and it is down to schools to ensure the fallen are not forgotten. Lucy's efforts have undoubtedly played a part in creating an enduring educational legacy and a fitting remembrance tribute from Ruislip High School to mark the centenary of the end of World War I.

HEADTEACHER'S NEWS

As staff, we have been reflecting this term on Ruislip High School's core purpose.



We believe a fundamental tenet of our school's ethos is our motto: *from grass roots, to reaching for the sky.* Our logo represents our motto and symbolises the importance of having high aspiration, the *reaching for the sky*, that is achieved from a start point, *the grass roots*. The second stanza of our school's pledge, *We stand at grass roots, We reach for the sky, We strive to progress, Hard work makes success*, emphasises the importance of hard work. My first ever assembly at the school in September 2011 focused on hard work equals success where I shared with students my experience of running the London marathon in 2009 after being a teenager who believed she couldn't run long distances. I certainly learned through running mile after mile, week after week, that this was made possible through the willingness and dedication to achieve my goal.

At Ruislip High, we avoid references to talent as we believe that success is achieved through hard work and the **inspiration** of the work of others; by having the **self-discipline** and **perseverance** to work hard and knowing you may need to fail in order to succeed; that our achievements are only valid if they have been attained through **integrity**; that **learning** is a life-long journey; and that we achieve great things as a community when we **respect** each other and come together in **unity**.

At our annual Presentation Evening, our student leaders in Year 11 and 13, spoke to the audience about their school experiences in particular how Ruislip High School has helped to shape them into young adults ready to face the future. I was particularly struck by deputy head student, Hannah's, metaphor of a tree as she spoke about her journey:



'From grass roots to reaching for the sky: after six and a bit years, the words are ingrained in my mind and reflecting on my time here, they also ring true. When hearing our motto, I have always pictured a tree. A small seed planted on our first day in year seven and by the time we leave, a strong tree with many branches reaching to the clouds.'

I was genuinely moved by Year 11 senior prefect, Amy's, speech as she thanked staff for their support and belief in her and ended her speech with the following:

'The late nights marking and staying behind and pushing me to do things I never thought I could achieve like standing here right now are things I will be eternally grateful for. So once again thank you. Thank you for teaching us how to be ambitious, how to reach for the stars and travel even further. Thank you for everything you've done for us Ruislip High. I promise we'll make you proud.'

I am in my 26th year of teaching and the one constant I have had throughout this time is that I feel rewarded on a daily basis by the students in terms of contributing to their development, aspirations, opportunities and achievements. I remain so proud to work in a school where our students do reach for the sky and recognise the strong partnership that exists between themselves and their teachers, as well as all the staff at the school, in order for them to fulfil their potential.

LET'S THINK SCIENCE GAMES

House Insulation Project

Year 9 are currently studying energy transfers of heat in their Physics lessons. To understand the topic further, they were tasked with planning, designing and building a model house using everyday recyclable materials, which later they had to insulate. The main aim of the task was to be original and create a house that could keep thermal energy trapped inside for a certain amount of time. All students spent a lot of time outside of lessons thinking about, and researching, how to insulate a house. Many students have been so creative that they tried to duplicate their house models like real insulated houses. For example, they have been using polystyrene packing balls and shaving foam to replicate foam filled cavity walls, and transparent



plastic sheets with plasticine to mimic double glazed windows. All students have shown great enthusiasm for the project so far and cannot wait to test out which insulated house was the best.

LATIN NEWS

Year 10

Last September, fifteen students started a wonderful journey through time by choosing Latin as a GCSE option.

This is a real challenge for the students as they have two years to cover both language, literature and civilisation curriculae (Latin students would tell you that this word is a nominative plural case of the second declension!).

The engagement and determination of these fifteen students are really phenomenal. For two years, they will follow the adventures of Quintus, a young Pompeian, in his journey through the Roman Empire after the destruction of his home town.

In the space of three months, our Latinists have covered the first book, learning about life in Pompeii and translating Latin texts into English. After the tragic eruption of Mount Vesuvius, and the death of some of our favourite characters, students are now going to travel with Quintus to Egypt and discover the wonderful traditions of a culture trying to survive, and mix with, the Roman invader.

Student voices

"Latin combines learning a language and also learning about a civilisation. Even if we only have two years to cover all the content, I believe I am always learning more. The way I am being taught give me independence and I feel I can develop my own way of learning." **Mikaiel, 10B.**

"In all honesty, I was a bit sceptical about picking Latin but, fortunately, Miss Lucas convinced me and now I am glad I am doing it! I get to learn about history, literature and of course the language. It is very interesting and it really helps me with my other subjects, like French. It has only been two and a half months and the whole class has gone from not knowing a word of Latin to being able to translate long, complex passages of Latin quickly and confidently. I am very happy to be studying Latin and I am glad I picked it!" **Isha, 10B.**

Year 11

The clock is ticking for our Year 11 group and the first set of Latin PPEs made students realise that effort always pays off. We were very impressed by the quality of work produced by many students across all papers. Well done!

But, if we could only mention one student, it would have to be Vicky (11A), who, through very hard work, reached a Grade 9 over the three papers. Here is what Vicky has to say about her Latin PPEs and revision techniques:

"I have revised a lot for the three exams. I use flashcards to revise vocabulary and verb endings; I also use the Cambridge website. For literature and civilisation, I go through our revision booklets over and over again.

I thought the literature paper was hard but I felt confident about my knowledge of the poems and writers. I felt very confident for the language paper but I think the civilisation paper was the hardest, because of the structure of the exam and the essay questions.

I was very happy when I saw my results and I am now hoping to get a Grade 9 in the actual exam! I want to do English Literature for A-level and Latin is helping me a lot with the language but also with the analysis of poems. It also encourages me to put modern history into perspective, which helps a lot too."

Sixth Formers take part in "Lessons from Auschwitz" project

Three Ruislip High Sixth Form students visited the Auschwitz-Birkenau former concentration camp in Poland on Thursday 18th October.

Verity and Olivia (Year 13), and Aoibhin (Year 12), were taking part in the "Lessons from Auschwitz" project organised by the Holocaust Educational Trust, with support from history teacher, Ms Horton. All over the world, Auschwitz has become a symbol of terror, genocide, and the Holocaust.

The project has several phases. On Sunday 14th October, the students visited a hotel in London's Canary Wharf for an introductory half-day seminar. Participants examined pre-war Jewish life and heard from a Holocaust survivor.

The one-day visit to Auschwitz-Birkenau, Poland, took place on Thursday 18th October. It was a long day for the students with a 6:30am flight from Stansted Airport to Krakow, and a return flight at 8:30pm. The Ruislip High students had a local guide as they visited the site. Then, on Tuesday 30th October, the students took part in a follow-up seminar back in London, exploring the contemporary relevance of the Holocaust.

Verity, Aoibhin and Olivia will now become school ambassadors for the "Lessons from Auschwitz" project and will produce a presentation for other students at Ruislip High to read. Verity said, "It was an eye-opening experience and it put the Holocaust events into perspective. It made the events we study in History seem real. The sheer size of Auschwitz-Birkenau really shocked me, seeing the awful conditions people lived in before so many of them died. Those responsible tried to stop the rest of the world seeing the gas chambers and finding out what happened."

Sixth Formers taste life at University

Year 12 Sixth Form students from Ruislip High took part in a University experience day on Friday 19th October. Half of the year group visited Royal Holloway, University of London, while the other half travelled to the University of Reading. Both groups experienced a lecture theatre talk about University life and had a full tour of the campus including seeing the students' union and halls of residence.

Matt Voller, a student ambassador from the University of Reading, said, "The Ruislip High students represented their school brilliantly and asked lots of interesting questions. As always we hope there will be some applications from your school."



A Ruislip High Year 12 student said, "We heard about all the different courses available and how University students learn. At their lectures we were surprised to hear that the students were allowed to make notes on their phones or tablet computers. We also had some tips on student finance and were quite impressed by the halls of residence which were really modern. The campus too was lovely with lots of open spaces."

Sixth Form Christmas Community Event

The Sixth Form Christmas Community Event took place in the atrium and Greens café area on Wednesday 12th December. Teacher of History and Head of Year 13, Ms Horton, who also played the role of Mrs McParlain, said, "Lucy's dedication, talent and perseverance have been outstanding to watch. Being involved in this play had been one of the proudest moments for me in my teaching career. Well done to Lucy, and all the cast and backstage helpers."

STUDENTS CONSIDER 'SELF-DISCIPLINE' AT THEME DAY 2018

The school's annual Theme Day took place on Friday 19th October. This key event in the school's calendar gives students the chance to have a fun, engaging and thought-provoking experience different from the usual timetable. The students had six 50-minute activity periods instead of the usual five one-hour lessons.

The school theme this year is 'self-discipline'. Much of the day centred on students learning about the centenary of Armistice Day on 11th November, 1918, marking the end of World War I hostilities.

Tutor group activities included making commemorative poppies which formed an impressive display in the atrium. Students also contributed to a whole-school 'Wipers Times' publication about life in the trenches, and tried to crack a code used to recruit war spies.

As part of Theme Day, the school aims to secure an inspirational speaker. This year the school welcomed James Aidoo who spoke to the whole school over three packed sessions in the main hall. James was an underachieving student from a single-parent household in North London. His journey as a student involved rock-bottom failure in his mock exams that served as a catalyst for a turning point in his mindset, academic achievement and future outlook. He discovered his purpose in life and things have shifted ever since as he has started his own successful business. James' assemblies powerfully showed students the importance of self-discipline in achieving goals.

Theme Day also included an inter-form activity and a physical activity. For the physical activity, Year 7 students took part in a World War I-themed Christmas truce. Year 8 students learnt how to dance the Charleston. Year 9 students tried World War I-themed cooking and Year 10 and 11 students took part in a boot camp experience. Theme Day remains an important part of life at Ruislip High, and the school hopes that students really enjoyed it!

The guest speaker at Ruislip High's Presentation Evening 2018 on Thursday 15th November was The Right Honourable Boris Johnson MP.

Mr Johnson delivered his speech in front of a packed audience of students, parents/guardians and staff in a specially decorated sports hall.

The annual Presentation Evening is a flagship event in the school's calendar and features student performances alongside a plethora of awards.

The event included a review of the past school year by Headteacher, Dr Lecky. Cllr Eddie Lavery, Chair of the Governing Body, gave the opening remarks and also introduced Boris Johnson.


Mr Johnson said "I am lost in admiration for all the winners here tonight. Well done to you all. However, I'd also like to speak out to all the 'non-winners'. In my own life, sometimes it's been the spur of failure that's given me the energy to keep trying new things. When I was at school, I was bad at many things. I was so bad at the piano that my teacher even started a campaign among my school friends to get me to give up! Only if you risk getting things wrong then you can get things right."

Mr Johnson also highlighted the leading position of the UK economy and how employment levels in the country are strong. He spoke proudly of the economic opportunities for young people growing up in west London, and pointed out that many products exported around the world are designed or produced in west London. Such products included bus stops for Las Vegas!

Student performances included a vocal solo of 'Summertime', originally recorded by My Chemical Romance, by Hannah in Year 13. The Year 7 choir of thirty students performed 'A Million Dreams' by Benj Pasek and Justin Paul.

As well as awards for effort and achievement across all subject areas, the school also presented fifteen special Bestowed Prizes. These included the Yarrow Cup for Citizenship (awarded to Hannah in Year 12); the Karan Sagoo Award for Student of the Year (awarded to Nicole in Year 12); and the Madcap Books Prize for Creative Writing (awarded to Portia in Year 9).

The Bestowed Prizes also featured a new award, the Nadira Morris Prize for Scientific Endeavour, handed to Marcelo in Year 12. Mrs Morris is a former Assistant Headteacher at Ruislip High, highly regarded for her ability to explain complex scientific concepts. Mrs Morris attended the event to present this award. Closing remarks were given by Gareth Davies, Head of School.



GEOGRAPHY NEWS

This term the department has displayed some photographs from the two residential field trips that took place towards the end of the summer term. Below are two display photographs which show the Sixth Form field trip to Norfolk and the GCSE field trip to Swanage.



The department is very proud of its new classroom names, as part of a whole-school initiative to name every classroom after an inspirational person. The geography classrooms are named after American aviation pioneer, Amelia Earhart, ocean map-maker, Marie Tharp, former president of the Royal Geographical Society, Michael Palin and Everest climber Sherpa, Tenzing Norgay.

Year 7

The final Year 7 topic of this term has been map skills and the British Isles. The students' treasure maps show they have developed several map skills including using direction and scale. The map skills topic will be assessed in the Year 7 exam in February 2019. Kareem, 7A, said, "It was really interested to make my own map and I made sure it had a clear scale and the instructions had several grid references." Year 7 students have made an impressive start. This term they have also studied atlas skills and the UK's longest river, the Severn.

Year 8

In the first half term, students studied the Earth's tectonic plate movements and the effects of ongoing volcanic eruptions on the Caribbean island of Montserrat. In the second half term, Year 8 students learned about the causes and effects of earthquakes in the USA. They then studied the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, and how efforts have been made to ensure people living in coastal locations are forewarned should an event of this magnitude ever happen again.

Year 9

Year 9 students started the term learning why countries are in different states of development.

Students then carried out a detailed assessment on why shanty towns exist around Cape Town in South Africa, and how these can be improved over time.

Year 9 students then learned about South America and Brazil. Alfie, form, said, "We learnt the meaning of Brazil's flag, including that the yellow rhombus symbolises the country's natural resources." Natalia, 9C, said, "We learnt the social history of Brazil, and how the population is made up of people from different backgrounds around the world." Connie, 9C, said, "I was interested that Brazil was colonised by Portugal in 1500. That's why they speak Portuguese there today."

Year 10

A large number of students have started GCSE Geography in Year 10 (125 students). The five classes are focussing on the three topics of the Unit 1 exam 'Living with the Physical Environment' (the Challenge of Natural Hazards, the Living World and Physical Landscapes in the UK). Students should start revising now for their Year 10 exam using their PLCs (personal learning checklists).

Year 10 students will then move on to the three topics of Unit 2 'Challenges in the Human Environment'. For Unit 3 'Geographical Investigations', students will carry out fieldwork on the residential field trip to Swanage in July 2019.

Year 11

The four Year 11 GCSE Geography classes spent the first few weeks of this term writing up their fieldwork enquires following their field trip to Swanage in July 2018. They have learnt many new data presentation and analysis techniques. Year 11 students have three exams to prepare for in summer 2019:

Unit 1: Living with the Physical Environment. Tue May 21, 2019, pm. 1hr 30mins. Unit 2: Challenges in the Human Environment. Wed June 5, 2019, pm. 1hr 30mins. Unit 3: Geographical Applications. Thur June 13, 2019, am. 1hr 15mins.

Updated 'Megabook' revision guides, written by the department, will be handed out at Year 11 parents' evening on 10th January 2019. They will also be shared electronically via Show My Homework.

Year 12

The new Year 12 A-level class is studying the Hazards unit with Mr Peacock and the Resource Security unit with Mr Alison. The end of unit assessments will take place in January 2019. Students will then study Changing Places and Coastal Systems and Landscapes, as well as statistical skills, before the four-day residential field trip to Norfolk in June 2019.
