The lucky year 13 students will be sitting their PPEs in the new hall! After Christmas, it is planned that all year 13 lessons will take place in the new classrooms. This will allow the school to create a new bubble ensuring that the year 12 and year 13 students have separate areas keeping them as secure as possible.


# **MEDIA STUDIES NEWS**

The Year 12 students have thoroughly engaged with the course and have taken the challenging A Level content in their stride. Level media much easier." Finally, Jonnie (C61) said: "Media Studies is easily my favourite lesson."




#### **GCSE Media Studies**

All of the students deserve a huge well done for their hard work this term, but a couple of



# **GEOGRAPHY NEWS**

#### Year 8

The Geography Department has as usual been enjoying teaching about the world in the autumn term. Did you know that the word 'Geography' comes from the Greek gē (Earth) and 'graphia' ('writing')? There has certainly been lots of 'Earth writing' taking place! The department is pleased to share some examples where students have taken photos or screen-shots of their work submitted via Google Classroom.

In Year 8, one of the topics this term has been all about plate tectonics and natural hazards such as volcanoes, earthquakes and tsunamis. Students studied the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami and how the world tried to respond to this hazard with new technology which was put to the test in the 2018 tsunami which struck Indonesia.

#### Year 7

The effort of Year 7 students this term has also been fabulous. They have enjoyed learning about topics including Water, Rivers and Flooding. The most recent topic has been Map Skills and the British Isles ahead of their exam in January. Year 7s have their revision list to refer

to, and the department also recommends the map skills videos produced by TV presenter Steve Backshall. Here's an example where students can revise 6-figure grid references www.youtube.com/watch?v=FXuo ocVMVU

#### Year 9

Year 9 topics have included International Development and South America. Students have researched how the Brazilian government tries to tackle illegal logging in the Amazon Rainforest

through the 'Ibama' team of forest police. Here is some excellent research from Adam in 9F who also found a striking picture of the forest police investigating some felled trees. Students also studied Brazil's 'Cristo Redentor' statue in Rio de Janeiro as a starting point for researching the New 7 Wonders of the World. Here is some interesting work from Ava in 9F who researched the Great Wall of China.

#### Year 10

The four classes in Year 10 GCSE Geography have made an impressive start. They have already finished the first topic 'The Challenge of Natural Hazards' and completed a unit assessment. Students followed the 'Ruislip Revise Top 5' well to help prepare. For example, here are some excellent revision notes produced by Keira and Liam in Year 10.


#### Year 11

Year 11 students have been making steady progress, and now look ahead to their pre-public

exams in January. Teachers are helping students revise via the Megabooks, which contain top tips, learning checklists, and a summary of each lesson from Year 10 and 11.

#### Sixth Form

Sixth Form students have been sitting pre-public exams in December 2020, which means that in January they will be analysing their results following the school's focus on D.I.R.T. (dedicated improvement and reflection time). 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## YEAR 11 NEWS

The Autumn Term has been an extremely challenging term for Year 11 with so much doubt and speculation hanging over them with regards to the Summer Term GCSEs. Despite this, the attitude and perseverance of the year group has been extraordinary and goes a long way to showing how strong and unified the cohort are and how they will support and help each other through any situation. Although there have been a number of things the school was unable to run this term due to restrictions, Year 11 have been involved in so many positive aspects of school life.

Here are just some of the things our year group should be very proud of for this term:

#### Year 11 Prefects

The Prefect selection process was very different as with many things this year. The process started during the first national lockdown when students submitted their applications online to Mr Askin and Mr Randall. Due to the high standard of applications, all students were invited to the interview stage. Mr Askin and Mr Randall were blown away by the students during this stage and were unable to select the team of 18. 12 students were selected in the first round with the final six selected four weeks later to make our magnificent team for this year. The process for all students involved will hopefully give the experience and determination to them to go and achieve great things in the years to come.

The final part of the process was to select the Senior Prefects. With 12 students applying Mr Davies and Mrs Hill selected six students to advance to the interview process. Similarly to Mr Askin and Mr Randall, the Headteacher and Deputy Headteacher were amazed by the high standards of the students. After this the four students were selected and Mr Davies took them on a tour of the new building.

#### **Prom/Yearbook Committee**

With all the uncertainty surrounding Year 11 at the moment, it was a relief to be able to provisionally book Brunel University for the Year 11 Prom. As a result, a Prom Committee was quickly selected and got to work on suitable dates, themes, perks and other ideas for July 2021 to hopefully celebrate what would have been two very different and testing years for the year group.

The yearbook committee have also been working hard this term with Mrs Ohana in creating a suitable reflective and reminiscing account of the year group's five year journey at Ruislip High School. We are looking forward to this creation that students can look back on with joy and laughter when they are studying next September in our Sixth Form.

#### **Study Club**

After the first few weeks of settling back into school life and Year 11, the Key Stage 4 Study Club returned. This gives students an opportunity to catch up on work they are behind with, a chance to revise and a chance to complete outstanding pieces of work. Year 11 has already completed over 100 pieces of outstanding work this term which will go a long way in helping these students achieve the grades they deserve.

Although on most occasions Study Club is compulsory for students with outstanding pieces of work, a number of Year 11s have been using this time to revise and complete pieces of homework. Mr Askin has been very impressed with the change in attitude in a number of Year 11 students towards their school work. A special mention needs to go out to the following students; Billy (W), Sonny (W), Baylee (W), George S (B) and Alfie (S), who attend at least twice a week voluntarily.

#### Year 11 Exercise Club

Mr Askin is a firm believer that a healthy body helps lead to a healthy mind. In October, a Year 11 exercise club started. Although most Above and Beyond activities are being put on hold due to tighter restrictions at school, Mr Davies agreed that an exercise club for Year 11 was a great opportunity for students in their GCSE year to ease the stress that they are under. This club was hugely helpful in doing this. Mr Rutter and Mr Askin involved a range of different exercises and the Year 11s have been enjoying these Friday afternoon sessions. The week before the second national lockdown, when this had to stop for a number of weeks, over 20 Year 11 students were in attendance. This is an excellent way to finish a tough week of work and revision and leave school for the weekend in a positive manner.

#### **My Tutor**

As students have missed huge amounts of lesson time over the past year, a number of catch up sessions and interventions are taking place to help students catch up, one of which is an online intervention called MyTutor. Over fifty Year 11 students are involved in this. Some get one to one support for one hour a week from University students. Other students work in groups of three with their peers and a University student expert. The students involved in this have really enjoyed and benefited from this experience. Isabelle (11A) commented : "I really like how I can tell him a topic I am struggling with and my tutor will make a session with exam questions and make sure I know what I'm doing and not let me move on without being sure." Skylar commented "My maths tutor explains things really well and doesn't mind repeating herself and slowing down when I don't understand. She also tries to make the lessons entertaining whilst learning so it actually makes me want to do the work."

#### **More Positive Times Ahead**

The Year 11 team are looking forward to the good times ahead for the year group. Now that the Prom has been provisionally booked and the Summer Exams provisional timetable is set to be released, students can start to prepare themselves with more certainty. The Year 11 students have also been given a tour of the new building, with the view to the majority of students returning in September 2021 to study here.

### **HISTORY NEWS**

As always the History department has thoroughly enjoyed teaching a varied and wide-ranging set of topics and skills to RHS students this term. Although this term has been particularly challenging, the RHS students have shown resilience and maturity beyond their years and have continued to impress the department with their attitudes towards the study of history.

At KS3 the highlights have definitely been watching the new Year 7 intake get stuck into the Romans and investigating complex issues such as 'Were The Romans Civilised?' and 'Why did the Roman Empire Collapse?'. Year 8 have impressed us with their knowledge of The Tudor Kings and Queens and have been working particularly hard on improving their vocabularies with challenging key words such as suppression, reformation and ecclesiastical! The Year 9 students have been on an historical journey through late Victorian London and on the way have discovered some rather unsavoury issues relating to the past of our fair capital city. More recently they have started an inquiry into the causes of WWI and have been deliberating the various importance of factors such as imperialism, militarism, alliances and nationalism. They are very much looking forward to looking into the spark that triggered the war in Sarajevo. The department hopes that in the new year students will be able to do some personal research on their family history during WWI.

The three new Year 10 classes have been working extremely hard to get to grips with the issues in post-war Germany and have wowed their teachers with their hard work and dedication. In particular their consideration of complex political issues leaves the department in no doubt that the future of our country is in good hands! Many of them are also engaging with new online technologies such as 'GCSE POD' to help them recap previous topics and prepare for new ones.

The Year 11 students are currently very busy preparing for their PPEs in January and have been working hard to revise under the expert guidance of their teachers. Many have been engaging in some of the online learning activities provided and all of them have been extremely focussed in the classroom. The department would urge students to remember though that often the simplest things are the best, and there is no substitute for a good set of flash cards and some past exam papers to practise.

And last but not least the department would like to recognise the dedication and hard work of our sixth form students. The new Year 12 class have been 'cooking on gas' this term and have already produced some really high-quality historical enquiries on topics such as 'Henry VII's Foreign Policy' and 'The effects of WWI on the political landscape in Russia'. There has been a real emphasis on wider reading and as such the students have been reading challenging articles and books by various different historians such as Orlando Figes and Richard Pipes. Like Year 11, Year 13 have spent a large portion of the term readying themselves for the PPEs they are currently sitting.

The next few terms will see them tackle topics such as 'Stalin's Role in WWII' and 'Interpretations of Elizabethan Foreign Policy' and then the examination preparations will begin in earnest. 



5. Do you enjoy your job? Yes I enjoy it a lot!


### 6. What excites you the most about your job?

speak French and English quite well but I also speak a bit of Dutch and Spanish.


#### 9. What made you want to move to England?

# YEAR 13 NEWS

I hope that this update finds you well. It has been a privilege to lead Year 13 through what is, even in normal times, one of the more challenging terms in the Sixth Form. Students have had to contend with the pressures of PPEs and post-18 applications, in addition to adjusting to being back in school following the disruption of the lockdown over the spring and summer. The resilience, determination and work ethic that so many of them have shown has been admirable and truly commendable.

At the time of writing, students are about to commence their December PPEs, which they have been working extremely hard towards. These PPEs will give students a clear idea of which areas of their courses they most need to revise, and will allow teachers to target their support to the areas of the curriculum that most need it. Following on from the PPEs, there will be a mock results day on Thursday 21st January for students to collect their results, which will be followed by a virtual parents' evening on Thursday 28th January. This will give you the chance to discuss your child's progress with their subject teachers via videolink. Further details about this will be sent shortly before the end of term on 18th December.

Students have also been working hard on their post-18 applications. The majority of the year group have applied to university, and it is really pleasing that so many are seeing offers of places. This is testament to the fantastic wider reading, work experience and other supercurriculur work that the students have been putting in. The final UCAS deadline for applications to be approved and sent off by the school is 6pm on Friday 15th January, so it is imperative that students who wish to apply for university send their application well in advance of this date. Students will have heard back from universities by the end of March, and will then have to select a "firm" and "insurance" choice from their offers. This, along with the student finance process, will be explained in the Spring Term. Students who are applying for apprenticeships using the vacancies websites that have been shared with them. ASK Apprenticeships will also be running a virtual applications workshop with students keen on apprenticeships on Tuesday 19th January. More information about this will follow.

I very much hope that, as we move towards the spring, we will have the chance to resume more and more elements of pre-pandemic schooling, with the opportunity for students to use our new Sixth Form centre building too. I have no doubt that this impressive group of students will continue to rise to the challenges ahead. I wish you all a restful break, and look forward to welcoming Year 13 back to school on Thursday 7th January.
