Reading in English

To be an expert in English, students will read like a subject expert. This means students will:

- Develop the habit of reading for both pleasure and information.
- Read a wide and challenging range of texts from a diverse range of writers.
- Acquire a wide vocabulary, an understanding of grammar and knowledge of linguistic conventions for reading.
- Interpret texts at a whole text, sentence and word level.
- Understand that words have different meanings and connotations.
- Understand that writers craft their language and create layers of meaning.
- Understand the influence of context and bias.
- Read fluently and with expression.

Typical texts that students will encounter in English lessons are:

Fiction:

- Novels and novellas
- Plays
- Short stories
- Poetry

Non-Fiction:

- Articles
- Letters
- Diary entries
- Essays
- Autobiographies and biographies
- Speeches
- Blogs

Students will be taught the following strategies that are specific to reading like an expert in English.

- Teachers will model expert reading to students with the expectation that students can then do this independently.
- Teachers will teach the skills relating to the reading domains:
 - Retrieve
 - Finding key details from a text
 - Using evidence from a text
 - Summarise
 - Skimming and scanning a text
 - Sorting and collating information
 - Clarify
 - Exploring figurative language
 - Exploring the effect of language choices
 - Infer/Analyse
 - Inferring meaning beyond the literal

- Justifying predictions
- Developing a personal response to a text
- Authorial intent
 - Identifying the message of a text
 - Identifying purpose, audience and genre of a text
 - Evaluating the effect of a text
- Compare/contrast
 - Identifying similarities/differences
 - Considering the reasons for differences
- Students will be taught how to respond to a text.
